

Week of December 22: Mary as Mother of God—What It Means

One of the oldest titles for Mary is “**Mother of God**”—but does that mean she existed before God? Not at all. It means she is the mother of **Jesus**, who is both fully human and fully divine.

In Luke 1:43, Elizabeth calls her “the mother of my Lord.” The Church declared at the Council of Ephesus in 431 AD that Mary could rightly be called *Theotokos*, “God-bearer,” because the child she bore was truly God.

This title protects a vital truth: that Jesus is one Person with two natures—God and man. If Mary is not the Mother of God, then Jesus is not fully God. Honoring her protects our belief in who Jesus is.

As we celebrate the joyful season of Christmas, I would like to extend my warmest wishes to you and your families for a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. This sacred season invites us to pause, reflect, and rejoice in the gift of Christ’s birth and the hope, peace, and love He brings into our lives.
